Our Commitment to Native Americans

Comcast is committed to identifying and expanding opportunities for American Indians and Alaskan Natives through supplier diversity, recruitment and career development, and community investment initiatives.

Recruitment and Career Development

- The Comcast recruiting team builds relationships with professional and community-based organizations across the country to solicit American Indians and Alaskan Natives to apply for jobs within our 39-state Comcast footprint.
- Comcast partners with the Emma L. Bowen Foundation (EBF) and the Congressional Black Caucus Foundation (CBCF), INROADS and the T. Howard Foundation each year to offer internships to minorities, including American Indians and Alaskan Natives, interested in careers in media and communications.

Supplier Diversity

- American Indian and Alaskan Native suppliers and vendors are registered in the Comcast Vendor Profile Directory and are conducting business at Comcast. We also establish new relationships with American Indian and Alaskan Native vendors by attending trade shows and business expos, and by partnering with organizations that promote diversity in business.
- For the sixth consecutive year, Comcast was named one of “America’s Top 50 Corporations for Multicultural Business Opportunities” by DiversityBusiness.com, the largest organization of women and minority-owned businesses in the United States.

Community Investment

- Comcast supports local organizations that serve the needs and interests of American Indians and Alaskan Natives. Some of our local partnerships include: Indian Walk-in Center of Salt Lake City, UT; First Nations Community Healthsource in Albuquerque, NM; Women of Nations in St. Paul, MN; Painted Sky in Portland, OR; Sinte Gleska University in Mission, SD; American Indian College Fund in Denver, CO; and Native American Youth and Family Center in Portland, OR.
- Through the Comcast Digital Connectors program, in partnership with One Economy, Comcast is training teens and young adults to use broadband and digital tools and to prepare for potential careers in digital media. In 2010, the program launched in more than 50 markets across the country, including: Albuquerque, NM; Portland, OR; St. Paul, MN and Seattle, WA.
